Adoption of Official Plan and Development Bylaw

At present Murray Harbour does not have an Official Plan or Planning Bylaw. Your Council believes that now is the time for us to work together to take control of our community's future.

BACKGROUND In Prince Edward Island all development or subdivision of land is regulated under the provisions of the <u>PEI Planning Act</u>. The Act provides two options for Island municipalities. They may remain under the provisions of the <u>Planning Act Regulations</u> and thus be under Provincial control, or they may prepare a municipal Official Plan and Development Bylaw and assume local control of land use and development.

The *Planning Act Regulations* only provide general standards for development and the subdivision of land. They do not regulate land use or create any enforceable land use zones. It is only via the preparation of a municipal Official Plan and Development Bylaw that the use of lands and buildings can be effectively regulated. This can have a major impact on property values and the protection of your interests as a home or land owner.

Under the current arrangement your local municipal Council has no authority over any development within the Community boundaries. Essentially, almost any form of development can take place on your street or beside your home or business and you and your Council have no say. In addition, you do not currently have any right to appeal a development permit due to any potential land use conflict. With our own Official Plan and Zoning and Subdivision Control (Development) Bylaw, Council would be in full control and all property owners and residents would have the right to appeal any development which they feel would negatively affect their interests. Council can also hold public meetings on any development application which they feel may be contentious.

It is equally important for Council to be able to protect and optimize the operation of our municipal sanitary sewer system and treatment lagoon. In the

current situation Council has essentially no say in where development can occur or what form the development will take. This can impose challenges for sewer services and could lead to extra costs which would have to be borne by the other users of the system. Murray Harbour is one of a very few centrally serviced communities which does not have an Official Plan and Development Bylaw to help control development.

OFFICIAL PLAN AND BYLAW An Official Plan is a policy document that is intended to present a shared vision of how the community would like to see itself develop in the future. The time period for the Plan is normally 15 to 20 years, but it can be longer. The most critical component of the Official Plan is public input. If the Plan truly reflects the values and the vision of our residents, business owners and land owners, then it will be successful.

The implementation of the policies within the Official Plan happens primarily through the provisions of the implementing Zoning and Subdivision Control (Development) Bylaw. The *PEI Planning Act* requires that the Development Bylaw must conform to the policies in the Official Plan.

Your council is convinced that the time has come for Murray Harbour to assume control of our development future. By developing a Plan for our future we are confident that we can better protect those elements of our physical surroundings and our current quality of life that we most cherish. We are also hopeful that by planning for our future we can achieve a better outcome than would be the case if we continue to leave our future in the hands of others.

Council is holding a first public meeting on the Official Plan adoption process on Monday, February 8th, 2016 at 7 PM in the Large Hall of the Murray Harbour Community Centre. Our Planning Consultant, Phil Wood of P. Wood & Associates, will be in attendance to answer any questions you may have on Official Plans. At this first meeting Council will also be starting the process of seeking input on various land use or development issues which residents would like considered as part of the Official Plan review. All residents and land owners are encouraged to attend and provide their input into this important process.

Interesting Facts About Prince Edward Island

- Prince Edward Island is the smallest province in Canada as well as the most densely populated province (24 people per square kilometer). It joined the Confederation in 1873.
- The island was discovered by Jacques Cartier in 1534.
- The original residents of the island were Mi'kmaq.
- Originally known as St. John's Island, it was renamed Prince Edward Island in 1799.
- Approximately 15% of electricity used on PEI is generated from renewable resources, predominately wind.
- Beer and soda (or pop) was not sold in cans on PEI until May 2008.
- Prince Edward Island gets its name from Prince Edward Augustus, the Duke of Kent. He was the father of Queen Victoria.
- The highest point in PEI is in Springton at 152 metres above sea level.
- The provincial flower is the Lady's Slipper.
- The provincial bird is the Blue Jay.
- The provincial tree is the Red Oak.

- PEI's famous red soil gets its color from the high iron content which oxidizes when exposed to the air.
- Potatoes represent over 1/3 of farm revenue for the province and PEI represents nearly 1/3 of Canadian potato production.
- PEI is the setting of Lucy Maud Montgomery's book, *Anne of Green Gables*. She also wrote the Island Hymn.
- PEI's motto is "The small under the protection of the great".

YTV will air the two-hour TV movie "Lucy Maud Montgomery's Anne of Green Gables" on February 15th, and is starring the well-known actor Martin Sheen as Matthew Cuthbert.

WinterDine 2016 A campaign designed to give downtown Charlottetowr restaurants a boost in what is typically a slow season, is about to kick off its 10th year. WinterDine begins Thursday, January 24th, and will run for three weekends This year, 19 restaurants are taking part, offering a three-course meal at either \$28 or \$38 per person. «WinterDine has been fabulously successful over the years» said Dawn Alan, executive director of Downtown Charlottetown Inc. «We grew this from a 1-weekend event that was mediocre at best, way back when, to a full 3 weekends». Ms. Alan is advising people not to wait until the last minute to book a table. «People have learned quickly that if you don't get your restaurant reservation in early, you won't get a WinterDine seat» she said. «As a rule, the last weekend of WinterDine, some of our restaurants are turning away as many as 80 reservations».
