# Council Welcomes New Members

The Rural Municipality of Murray Harbour held a by-election on November 6 to fill two vacancies on the council. Sixty-seven voters (33%) turned out to cast ballots for the three candidates: Marlene Chapman, Calvin Fraser and Kelly Matheson. Kelly Matheson and Marlene Chapman were elected.

Kelly Matheson is a long-time resident of Murray Harbour, an administrative assistant at Montague Regional High School, and server/cook seasonally at Harbourview Restaurant. Marlene Chapman has been living in the village since 2018, works in the lobster fishery with her husband, and is completing a Master of Arts in Island Studies degree at UPFI.

### Memorial Tree Update

Although the actual removal of the Memorial Tree is a volunteer effort, funding has been secured through the PEI Department of Fisheries, Tourism, Sport and Culture to cover the disposal fees of the lobster traps.

We had hoped to have the tree dismantled by the end of October and the memorial buoys either stored in a barn at 152 Robertson Road or in the hands of their owners for repair/updating, but the weather has not been our friend.

By the time you read this, the tree should be dismantled. It is our hope a permanent structure will be in place by the opening of the next lobster season.

# **Council Reports and Projects**

### **Planning Committee**

It has been a very busy construction season for the Community Building Fund (CBF) (i.e., the old Gas Tax program). Somerset Gardens Inc. from Kinkora has been the prime contractor and did a wonderful job.

The **sidewalk extension** is complete from the Post Office to the corner at the Baptist Church, providing a safe pedestrian walkway.

The Fitness Park is complete with four pieces of user-friendly exercise equipment set up adjacent to the children's playground. Try them out!

The Heritage Park in front of the Community Centre is complete except for placement of the old school bell and pedestal mount.

The Fishermen's Memorial and new lookout on the south-side of the wharf is complete with the exception of the placement of the monument itself. The site looks fantastic and will be a centre piece for the village that everyone can be



proud of. Besides the bell and monument, plantings scheduled for spring 2024 at all these locations adding the final touches.

The Community Garden (constructed by AE MacKay & Sons and Primus Construction Ltd.) was a resounding success. We are currently waiting for a possible expansion grant through the local Friendly Circle group for 2024—fingers crossed! If you would like to use the community garden, contact the Village Office to get your name on the list for the 2024 season.

### Planning Committee, con'd

The Green Energy project's solar panels (installed by Sunly Industries) on the Community Centre roof have gone through their first full year and are saving us approximately \$300/month on the electricity bill.

The Outdoor Recreational Improvements project centred around the very popular ball hockey league with new bumper pads being purchased.

The CBF is federally funded and is coming to the end of its five-year plan in 2024. We are waiting to hear about a continuation of this funding stream, which has seen \$100,000 per year allocated to Murray Harbour. While projects must fall within certain guidelines, these funds have provided numerous benefits to area residents and visitors, and as such we hope it continues in some fashion. We look forward to providing further updates in coming newsletters.

### Fundraising and Events

The Fundraising Committee of the Rural Municipality of Murray Harbour has had a very busy and successful year, already exceeding our fundraising goal! This is because of the contributions of our many talented volunteers, and all who take part in and donate to our events.

Some of the activities we had were a New Year's Dance, Games Night, St. Patrick Day Dance, Children's Easter Egg Hunt, Lobster Collection from our generous local fishermen and processors, Canada Day Celebrations, End of Summer Bash, Halloween Dance, and Harbour Lottery.



Two events are being planned now: the Senior's Dinner for the Murray Harbour Mail Route on Dec. 16<sup>th</sup> and our New Year's Dance on Dec. 31<sup>st</sup>.

### Maintenance Committee

Bravo! We now have a streetlight at the corner of Mariner's Lane!

Over the summer, asphalt repairs have been completed in the pedestrian area between the fire hall and the bridge, and new walkway lines added.

A broken stretch of sidewalk between the post office and Butler's General Store has been repaired as a part of the sidewalk extension.

PEI Transportation and Infrastructure has indicated they will complete the asphalt sidewalk from Machon Point Road into Rail Head Park when they are working on other local asphalt projects in 2024. Soon we will have a safe and secure pedestrian walkway linking residents from one end

of the village to the other and providing access to community services.

Improvements and repairs at Rail Head
Park included a new eaves trough and
updated signage. This was Fiona damage
missed at the time, but retroactively
claimed and covered by insurance.
Thanks to Carol White and Jackie McNeilDoiron for their work in updating the
information.

We have been able to improve the entrance to the dog park by adding a significant amount of gravel which should take care of the wet and muddy conditions that crop up throughout the year. Please pick up after your pets to ensure all users return home with clean feet! Unfortunately, we often receive feedback that some users are not doing their part on this account.


# Murray Harbour Walking Tours 2023



# Council Approves a Study into Benefits of Amalgamation

In November, the rural municipalities of Murray Harbour and Murray River passed resolutions supporting a study to assess the costs and benefits of forming a new, larger municipality for the Southern Kings area, which would encompass Murray Harbour, Murray River, and the districts of their fire departments. The resolution also requests funding from the provincial government for the study.

The area of study would border Three Rivers to the north and Belfast to the west, an area that could create a municipality of approximately 3,000 residents. The purpose of the study would be to investigate the viability of a community of this size and nature.

The Murray Harbour municipality is concerned about its ability to provide the level of services their residents expect and deserve with their current size and resources. They recognize that by coming together with other communities, the area could benefit from increased infrastructure funding, tourism and economic development, attraction of new residents, proper land planning, and community programming. This study will enable the councils to gather more information and consult with residents

about the options, implications, and viability of moving forward.

The two existing councils will appoint a committee, with representatives from each of the municipalities and from each of the fire districts, to oversee the study. Participation of residents in unincorporated areas and the two existing municipalities is critical to the study. Their thoughts and perspectives will be included in any recommendations.

Funding from the province would be used to hire a consultant to conduct the study and a communications person to ensure residents are kept informed and engaged as the process unfolds. Anticipated completion of their report would be early 2025.


# Investigation into Code of Conduct Breach Complete

As per the Municipal Government Act, a third-party investigation was undertaken in October in response to a formal complaint regarding the conduct of Councillor John Robertson in relation to a message posted on the sign at his private property in late September.

The investigation, conducted by a retired RCMP officer, found Councillor Robertson to be in breach of four of the five complaints of breach of conduct. In response to the findings, the Murray Harbour Municipal Council voted to have Robertson suspended from Council for six months. He is also required to pay a fine and submit a letter of apology. If he does not comply with the sanctions, the matter will be brought to the provincial government for further action.
