Spring is a time when Murray Harbour comes alive! Whether you participate in the lobster fishery or






Council Committee Reports

Finance Committee

The 2024-2025 operating budget was approved at Council's March 13, 2024 meeting and submitted to the PEI government for approval. The budget included a 4% increase in property tax for commercial properties and 2% for non-commercial properties. To put this in context, a home assessed at \$100,000 will see an increase of less than \$12 per year and commercial property assessed at \$250,000 will see an increase of just over \$26 per year.

Total income from all sources for the village is budgeted at \$321,442 versus expenditures of \$311,991, resulting in a surplus of \$9,451. The municipality's major budgeted revenue sources are property taxes (\$133k), grants (\$45k) and



fundraising (\$10k). The major budgeted expenses are insurance (\$35k), payroll (\$38k), auditors (\$8k), infrastructure maintenance (\$25k), and utilities (\$29k). The full budget is available on the village website and at the office.

Planning Committee

The province has again pushed back the deadline for Municipal Planning Services (Official Plan and Bylaws) to December 31, 2025. An expression of interest to have the PEI government investigate the pros and cons of amalgamation of Murray Harbour, Murray River, and surrounding Fire Districts was not supported by the Murray River Council. The idea of annexation of the Murray Harbour Fire District into the Regional Municipality of Murray Harbour has been batted about for some time and your Council is in the very early stages of considering how and when to move forward on this.

The village is currently looking at options for development of the property owned on Cemetery Road—the 'old dump' site. The Southeast Environmental Association (SEA) has been approached to see what opportunities may exist, such as walking trails, forest management, wildlife habitat creation, etc.

Recent capital projects are the result of the Canadian Community Building Fund (CCBF), the old 'Gas Tax' program. This 5year federal program came to an end in 2024 and we are awaiting news of a future program. Murray Harbour was given a direct allocation of \$100,000 per year in the last five-year cycle and had two bump-up years to \$200,000. Recent projects under this program include the sidewalk extension from the post office to Robertson Rd corner (\$214k), sewage lagoon generator (\$49k), outdoor recreation equipment (\$35k), heritage hark (\$65k), fitness park (\$75k), community centre basement rehabilitation (\$44k), dog park access (\$4k), soccer field (\$15k), north wharf gazebo (\$12k), Community Garden (\$41k), electronic sign (\$35k), solar panels (\$60k) and fishermen's memorial (\$96k).

Maintenance Committee Gary MacKay

The 2024-2025 operating budget approved \$25,000 on infrastructure maintenance as much work is needed in this area. At the Community Centre we are replacing the brick chimney, installing handrails on basement stairs, updating electrical outlets, repairing the dishwasher, replacing and relocating the propane tank, painting outside and inside, and repairing shingles. We are also

replacing/updating lighting at the south wharf and fishermen's memorial and some village signage, as well as addressing a number of other items that need attention.

The village was successful with its application under the federal Two Billion Tree Program (2BT) for \$37,750 for the planting of 100 large caliper native trees species. These will include red oak, yellow birch, white pine, serviceberry, white spruce, sugar maple, and red maple. Planting locations include Railhead Park, the dog park/community garden area, fitness park, and heritage park areas. □

Fundraising and Events Committee Paul L. White

The Fundraising Committee had a very successful 2023-24 fiscal year raising over \$15,000! This required a lot of time and donations from numerous community members and businesses, and we sincerely thank everyone for their contributions, great and small.

The weekly 50-50 draws were the largest contributor financially at \$7,800. The Canada Day event, yard sale and end of summer events raised over \$2,000 each and the Grab n'Go contributed over \$1,000. We also hosted a number of community events throughout the year

such as the Easter Egg Hunt, Senior's Christmas Dinner, spaghetti dinner, as well as dances on Halloween, St Patrick's Day and New Years Eve.

Already this year we have had a couple of dances and our Easter Egg Hunt. Coming up is our Canada Day celebrations, car show, yard sale, end of summer event and the seniors' Christmas dinner. We are now accepting donations for our tables at the 70 Mile Yard Sale in September. If you have any items you would like to donate from now until then, drop them off at the Village Office on Tuesday through Friday or call Paul White for pick up (902-969-7434).

Once again this year our fishermen were asked to donate lobster for our upcoming events. Thank you to these generous fishermen! We will be having a lobster shelling gathering at the Community Centre on June 8 at 10 am. Contact me if you would like to lend a hand.

Again, thank you so much to everyone who volunteers, donates and participates in our events! It helps raise money and community spirit.

Emergency Management Pam Oickle

Great news! We have received our capacity certificate from the Fire



Marshal's office after doing some needed work to meet the fire requirements for the centre. A huge shout out to Anne Harnesk, Victor Legacy, and Rob Oickle for making this happen!

Additionally, because of this work, we have also received our designation as a Certified Reception Centre which means that we are able to apply for funding to potentially do repairs and enhancements that will allow us to better serve the community in the event of an emergency. We have had a contractor evaluate what work can be done to improve our facility and will soon submit a grant application for funding available through the provincial government for Certified Reception Centres.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to contribute to the creation of our wish list for an upgraded Reception Centre! Your contribution was invaluable as we continue this journey.



Community Garden to be Expanded

The Southeast Environmental Association (SEA)—in collaboration with the Friendly Circle Seniors Club and with United Way funding support—is planning to expand the current footprint of the community garden to the north under Project Nectar.

The project hopes to double the size and number of above ground planters. SEA's media release describes it as "...a community food garden expansion and pollinator habitat enhancement project to support social connections, physical activity, and environmental engagement for seniors living in rural PEI."

This collection includes things like musical instruments, radon detectors, energy meters, CO² monitors, thermal cameras, white noise machines, light therapy lamps, disk golf sets, fitness and yoga kits, technology kits, mental health book kits, walking poles, and telescopes to name a few. Your library card also gives you access to a free TCAP pass in Montague, which is available to borrow at the front desk in Montague library.

Saltwire publications are also available to read on library computers and the CBC Corner—which contains all of CBC and Radio-Canada's digital content—has been added to the PEI Library website in the online resources section. The library computers also offer free access to Ancestry.com for those interested in researching their family history.
