There was a fantastic turn-out for the touching ceremony at the Cenotaph, tree dedication and reception. Numerous families were able to take part in planting a tree in remembrance of their ancestors and loved ones. The trees, which Marek donated from his nursery on the Mill Road, are a mix of yellow birch and red oak, which will be beautiful to enjoy in the coming years. In time, plaques recognizing each soldier will be placed with their tree.



Village Receives Beautification Award





Residents are invited to share their ideas for future capital and infrastructure investments at the Council's next regular meeting on January 8 at 6 pm. Murray Harbour can receive up to \$100,000 per year over the next five years from the Canada Community Building Fund (CCBF). Examples of eligible projects include public transit, community energy systems, disaster mitigation and facilities for culture, tourism, sport, and recreation. 

Council Committee Reports

Finance and Infrastructure Maintenance

The budgeting process will begin in early 2025. Essential operating costs for our Village accounted for over two-thirds of last year's budget. It is mandatory to submit a budget to the PEI government that at least breaks even, something we have been able to do on a regular basis. To get us to that level it often means a slight increase in taxes, even with the impressive fundraising revenue we take in each year. We'll do everything we can to minimize any negative impact on the taxpayers.

It has been a busy schedule for much needed repairs in and around the Community Centre. Everything from fresh paint to a new chimney, new planters and garbage bins to a new furnace room and handrails on the basement stairways to name a few. We're looking forward to continuing this program in 2025.


